Enjoy your summer!



1	Visit the Scholastic book site where students can log reading hours to win						
	digital prizes and help set a new world record for summer reading.						
	Scholastic.com/summer						
2	Visit your local libraries to sign up for summer reading programs.						
3	Open the magic daily with a picture book!						
4	Create a list of 10 places your student would like to read this summer.						
	Visit those 10 special places.						
5	Traveling this summer?						
	Trips can be a fun way to encourage reading. Ask your children to read						
	traffic signs and billboards aloud. Show them how to read a map, and						
	once you're on the road, let them take turns being the navigator.						
6	Read aloud together with your child every day. Make it fun by reading						
	outdoors - on the front steps, patio, at the beach or park. Also, let your						
	children read to you.						
7	Let kids choose what they want to read, and every so often, read the						
	same book your child is reading and discuss it.						
8	Play word games while in the car. Example: "A" stands for apple, or "C"						
	stands for carnival. Tell a story by each person adding on to what the						
	other person said.						
9	When watching a movie, ask the child a question about the plot. Have						
	them respond with evidence from the picture.						
10	Start a book club with your child's friends. Each week a different parent						
	can host.						
11	Create a writing journal of your favorite summer activities.						
12	Use picture books to help your child practice reading skills. Examples:						
	Cause and Effect, Point of View, Compare and Contrast, Inference,						
	Summarize						
13	Let your child help cook by reading the recipe card.						
14	Read books from different genres and keep a running total to see how						
	many different genres of books you can read during the summer.
